- b) What important elements does Jesus identify when He shares this mission assignment with His disciples?
- c) What was the core message they were called to proclaim? Luke 24:44–48, Matthew 28:19
- d) Read two examples of this core message: Acts 3:13–21; Acts 10:34–43. What is your reaction?

**3. Prophecy regarding the return of Jesus**

- a) Acts 1:9–11
- b) Who are the two individuals dressed in white? Acts 10:30, John 20:12
- c) What is significant about Luke’s description of the ascension of Jesus? (Luke 1:2 identifies his sources)

- b) What were the important qualifications for the twelfth apostle?
- c) What are your thoughts about the process the early Christians followed to replace Judas? Acts 1:23–26
- d) What lessons about church leadership can we learn from this story that might be helpful today?
- e) Why did the early Christian leaders later abandon the casting of lots as a way of discerning God’s leading? Acts 5:3; 11:15–18; 13:2; 16:6–9
- f) How can we discern God’s will for our lives today?
